



Impact of Government Spending on Q2 Economic Performance

Out of these disbursements, Php 838.5 billion¹ represented the government's share in the country's total nominal GDP of Php 5,207.1 billion¹ during the same quarter. Also known as the Government Final Consumption Expenditure (GFCE)², the amount represented a 7.1% decline Y-o-Y largely due to lower-than-expected Maintenance and Other Operating Expenditure (MOOE).



¹ At constant 2018 prices

² The Philippine Statistics Authority defines GFCE as the government's direct spending on services and goods for the country, such as defense, education, public order, and safety. To estimate GFCE, the value of any proceeds from sales of government output is subtracted from the total expenditure on providing services. For example, passport fees are excluded from the total cost of providing the passport, as the cost is borne by the passport holder.

For the Period January to June 2023

The strong performance in National Government (NG) disbursements during the first half of 2023 made up for the decrease in the combined allotment and capital transfers to Local Government Units (LGUs) resulting from the latter's lower National Tax Allotment (NTA) shares.

NG disbursements amounted to Php 2,411.9 billion for the first half of 2023, which is slightly higher by Php 10.1 billion or 0.4 percent compared to the same period last year.

Infrastructure and Other Capital Outlays

Up by Php 36.7 billion or 7.8% Y-o-Y

- acceleration of implementation of various infrastructure projects of the DPWH nationwide
- direct payments made by development partners for the implementation of foreign-assisted rail transport projects of the DOTr

Interest Payments

Up by Php 25.2 billion or 9.8% Y-o-Y

 higher interest rates for domestic and foreign loans, notably those priced relative to the Secured Overnight Financing Rate

Subsidy

Up by Php 11.0 billion or 20.8% Y-o-Y

Up by Php 10.6 billion or 1.6% Y-o-Y
